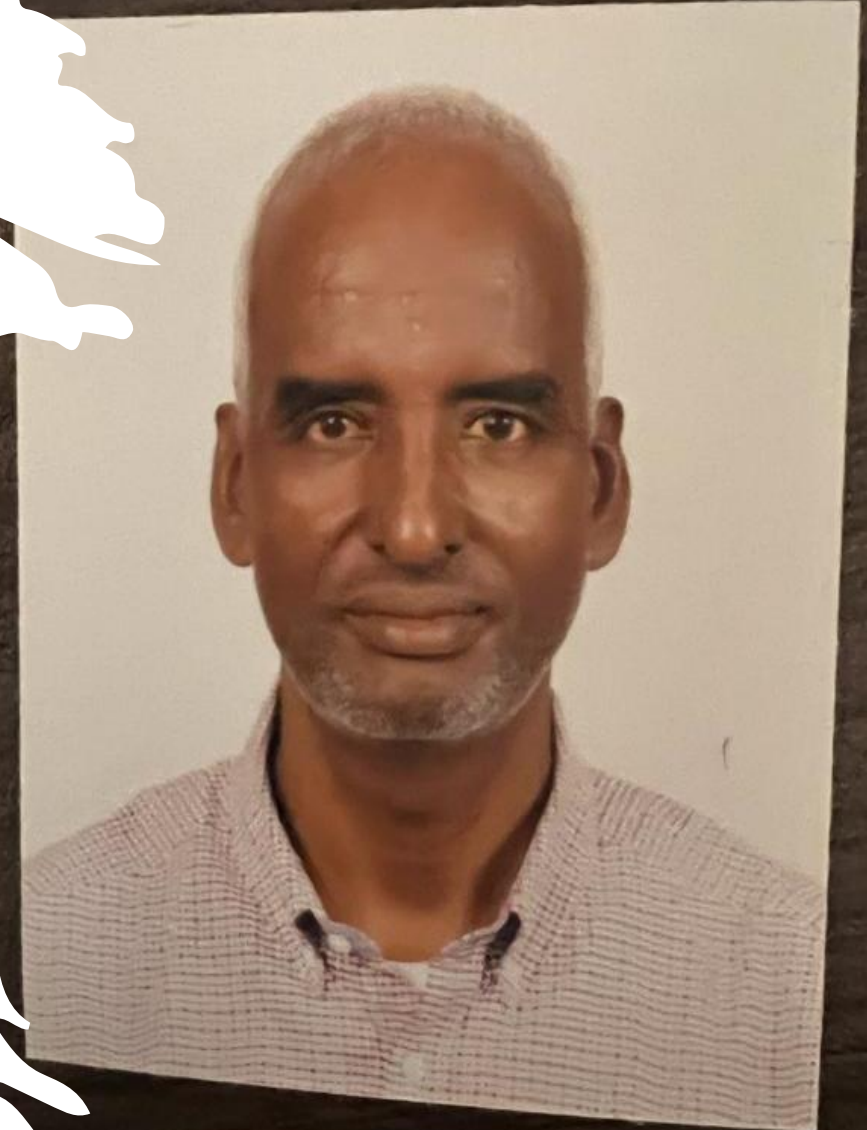
Just in the year 2022, a total of 1,049 children passed away while in nutrition centers, and there are likely many more who didn't have access to these centers. Additionally, it is estimated that approximately 1.8 million children under the age of five will suffer from acute malnutrition until mid-2023, with over 513,000 of them expected to be severely malnourished in Somalia, GREDO strives to contribute to the collective Humanitarian needs response.

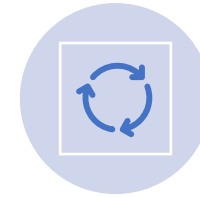

Improved Health Outcomes

The health domain of GREDO encompasses various activities and services aimed at improving the overall well-being of the communities we serve. This outcome focuses on Improved Access to Basic and Primary Healthcare, Enhanced Reproductive Health, Increased Community Health Awareness, Improved Community Sanitization and Hygiene Practices, Strengthened Social Mobilization, and Disease Prevention and Control. The overarching goal is to improve health outcomes, promote well-being, and empower communities to take charge of their own health. This sector received support from donors and partners such as BRCiS, Irish Aid, IRC, and Danwadaag Consortium.

- ❑ The total number of people consulted and treated at BHA health facilities was 147,453. (Males: 41,389; Females: 106,064).
- ❑ 4,242 children received PENTA3 immunizations (males 1941, females 2,301)
- ❑ The total number of people treated for communicable diseases under the BHA project was 109,850 (Males: 34,963; Females: 74,887).
- ❑ The number of mothers attended by a skilled birth attendant was 2960.
- ❑ A total of 22,745 mothers received ANC services at health facilities.
- ❑ A total of 48,673 people benefited from sustainable health services provided by the BRCiS project at two health facilities in Baidoa.
- ❑ Under the BRCiS grant, 5,607 pregnant mothers attended ANC visits at health facilities.
- ❑ A total of 2,431 children were treated for malaria, Pneumonia, and diarrhoea.

- ❑ The number of people who benefitted from free health service under Irish Aid project were 5,727 out of (1,682 Male and 4,045 Female).
- ❑ 163 (36 Boys and 138 Girls) children received immunization services.
- ❑ The number of pregnant women who attended antenatal care services at health facilities were 1,138 and 369 benefited Postnasal care services.
- ❑ A total of 1,910 (412 Boys and 1,332 Girls) children screened for malnutrition status out of 521 (80 Boys and 402 Girls) were met MAM criteria and 275 (122 Boys and 234 Girls) were met criteria of SAM.
- ❑ 6,680 (104 Male Boys and 6,576 Women) benefited key messages for IYCF, health education and health promotion messages and field and community level.

- ❑ A total of 17,148 beneficiaries received IRC-supported primary health care services, including 6,943 men and 10,205 women.
- ❑ 2,197 children were immunised at health facilities supported by the IRC emergency project fund.
- ❑ The number of people who benefitted from free health service were 6,480 out of (2,003 Male and 4,477 Female).
- ❑ 3,107 (1,532 Boys and 1,575 Girls) children received immunization services.
- ❑ The number of mothers who attended antenatal care services provided at health facilities under the Danwadag project was 1,426 and 852 benefited Postnasal care services.
- ❑ A total of 2,689 (1,426 Boys and 1,227 Girls) children screened for malnutrition status out of 172 (109 Boys and 63 Girls) were Met MAM criteria and 59 (32 Boys and 27 Girls) were met criteria of SAM.
- ❑ 6,702 (1,311 Boys and 5,391 Girls) benefited health education and health promotion messages and field and community level.

Health and Nutrition:
In 2022, GREDO operationalized 10 new health facilities across Southwest Somalia, GREDO has 7 active Health and nutrition projects across the state, and Luuq, Bardheere, Marka, Elberde, and Aato are the new locations for H&N activities.



Improved Nutrition Status and Access

The outcome aims to promote Systematic Treatment for Acutely Malnourished, Expanded Access to Nutrition Services, Enhanced Nutritional Education and Counseling, and Strengthened Capacity for Nutrition Service Delivery. The ultimate goal of these efforts is to improve the nutritional status of acutely malnourished individuals, particularly children, pregnant women, and lactating women. By expanding access to nutrition services and ensuring the provision of evidence-based care, GREDO aims to reduce malnutrition rates, prevent complications associated with malnutrition, and promote healthier outcomes for women and children in the communities we serve. This sector received support from donors and partners such as BRCiS, Irish Aid and IRC.

- ❑ A total of 91,536 (Males 32,704, Females 58,832) people screened for malnutrition.
- ❑ MAM cases treated 15,693 (5,368, females 10,325)
- ❑ SAM cases treated 6,249 (males 2,786, females 3,463).
- ❑ IYCF-behavioral change 67,227 (females 66,298, males 929)
- ❑ A total of 1,638 (802 males and 836 females) children aged 6 to 59 months were treated at TSFP programmes in Hudur and Baidoa funded by the IRC.



- ❑ 4330 caregivers who received IYCF-based behaviour change interventions, with 4163 being female and 167 being male.
- ❑ 25547 (Males 8934, Females,16613) had been screened for malnutrition.
- ❑ SAM cases admitted and treated at nutrition facilities under the BRCiS project was 3036, with 1200 males and 1836 females.
- ❑ Total number of MAM cases detected and treated at TSFP programmes under the BRCiS project was 5565, with 1871 Male and 3694 female.
- ❑ 15853 people who received IYCF-based behavioral change interventions, with 15691 being female and 162 being male.

Overcoming Adversity: A Story of Resilience and Hope in Jawarey IDP Camp

GREDO's Health and Nutrition Emergency Project Making a Difference

Amid severe drought and displacement, Halima Adan Madey, and her two-year-old granddaughter, Hamdi Ali, found themselves facing immense challenges. Forced to leave their village due to scarcity of resources, they sought refuge in the Jawarey IDP camp in Baidoa, Bay region, Somalia. With limited access to basic necessities, including sanitation and clean water, their situation grew increasingly dire. However, a ray of hope emerged when they crossed paths with GREDO and its life-saving interventions.

The Struggle for Survival

Halima shared the heartbreaking account of their struggles in Goof-Gaduud, where the drought had ravaged the land and depleted their means of sustenance. With no food to eat and water sources drying up, they were left with no choice but to flee their home. Losing their livestock, which served as their livelihood, added to their already desperate circumstances. Their only respite came in the form of a temporary shelter in the IDP camp, but their daily needs remained unmet.

A Lifeline from GREDO

Amidst this challenging backdrop, GREDO's Health and Nutrition Emergency Project became a lifeline for Halima and Hamdi. Through their outreach efforts and the support of the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), GREDO provided critical assistance to drought-affected communities. The project aimed to strengthen the local health and nutrition systems and address the prevailing malnutrition crisis.

A Timely Intervention

GREDO's Community Nutrition Volunteers (CNV) team, conducting regular house visits, identified Hamdi's critical condition. The young girl, suffering from severe acute malnutrition, weighed a mere 7kg and exhibited alarming measurements. Urgent

action was required to save her life. Halima and Hamdi were swiftly directed to the Towfiq Health and Nutrition Center, equipped with an Outpatient Therapeutic Program (OTP), where comprehensive care was provided.

Road to Recovery

Hamdi's treatment commenced immediately, with the dedicated healthcare professionals at the center administering essential medications, including amoxicillin and vitamin A supplements. Alongside this, she received Ready-To-Use Therapeutic Food (RUTF) to restore her nutrition. Under the watchful eye of GREDO's CNVs, Halima received guidance on the significance of RUTF and the importance of continued care.

A Promising Outcome

After three weeks of diligent treatment and nurturing support, Hamdi's health began to improve significantly. Her weight increased to 8kg, and her MUAC measurement expanded to 12cm. These positive developments led to her discharge from the OTP, marking a milestone in her journey to recovery. Hamdi was then transferred to the Target Supplementary Feeding Program (TSFP) site for ongoing care and support.

A Call for Assistance

While GREDO's intervention has been instrumental in saving Hamdi's life, the challenges faced by Halima and her granddaughter extend beyond their immediate health needs. In her quest to rebuild their lives, Halima appeals for humanitarian assistance, including food, housing, and financial support. GREDO recognizes the ongoing drought crisis and endeavors to provide comprehensive aid to those affected.

Building Resilient Communities

GREDO's Health and Nutrition Emergency Project, generously funded by FCDO, aims to empower local communities, and enhance their resilience in the face of recurring challenges. The project not only offers vital healthcare and nutrition services but also strengthens the local systems to prevent, diagnose, and respond effectively to malnutrition cases and epidemic outbreaks. Halima and Hamdi's journey reflect the courage and determination of individuals confronting adversity.

Improved Access to Safe Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) Facilities and Practices

This outcome encompasses several key elements including Provision of Clean Drinking Water, Construction of Sanitation Amenities, Effective Hygiene Promotion and Capacity Building for Community Stakeholders. Through these efforts, GREDO aims to improve access to safe water, enhance sanitation conditions, and promote good hygiene practices within communities. By addressing these vital aspects of WASH, GREDO seeks to improve the overall health and well-being of individuals and contribute to the realization of their basic human rights.

- ❑ A total population of 394,847 (217,166 female and 177,681 Male) has been reached for the year 2022.
- ❑ Water accessibility had been improved through the establishment of strategic water sources in drilling boreholes. Rehabilitation of boreholes, shallow wells, and rainwater catchment.
- ❑ Contributed to community resilience building through the engagement and strengthening of existing community structure.
- ❑ Close consultation and collaboration with the line ministries, and target communities were made throughout the implementation of temporary water trucking through voucher, rehabilitation, construction of latrines in the health/nutrition centers, IDPs settlements and promotion of good hygiene practices.







Protection: Empowered Women and Children, Elimination of Violence, and Promotion of Gender Equity

This outcome focuses on several key elements including Elimination of Violence Against Women and Children, Alternative Life Skills and Vocational Training, Gender-Sensitive Community-Based Development Programs, Child Rights Protection and Advocacy and Sensitization on Harmful Effects of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM). By working towards this outcome, GREDO aims to empower women and children, eliminate violence, and promote gender equality in Somali communities. Their efforts focus on creating safer and more inclusive environments where women and children can thrive, exercise their rights, and actively contribute to the betterment of society. The donors and partners for this program include BHA, IRF, Oxfam-SHCRP and CARE - Somalia Drought Joint Response.

- ❑ Accompanied community-based CP community awareness raising campaign sessions regarding child protection violation and exploitation affecting and putting children at risks in Barawe, Cato, Berdale, qoriyoley and Yeed districts then reached for 1648 beneficiaries like adult-954-(Men-322 Women-632 and children-694 boys-342, girls-352).
- ❑ Conducted child protection training for 728 (M-316, F-412) child welfare committees and other community structures (religious elders, community leaders, camp leaders, women groups, youth, adolescent's girls, and boys including children).
- ❑ Distributed dignity tools to 1,310 girl survivors

Enhanced Access to Quality Education for Children, Particularly Girls and Vulnerable Populations

This outcome aims to improve educational opportunities for children in Somalia and includes Early Childhood Education, Rehabilitation of Schools, Focus on Girls and Vulnerable Children, Education Curriculum and Teaching Materials, and Comprehensive Approach to Education, including Basic Alternative Education (ABE), Formal Education, Non-formal Education, and Teachers' capacity building. This allows for flexible learning pathways and the development of teaching skills among educators to improve the overall quality of education.

- ❑ 3 multi-year Education grants active and ongoing.
- ❑ 22,295 students got access to Quality Education through provision of Education in Emergency support.
- ❑ Capacity building had been done for the teachers and line ministry's Regional Education Officers and District Education Officers across all the 5 districts which GREDO is implementing Education projects.





Enhanced Food Security and Livelihoods for Vulnerable Communities in Southern States of Somalia

This outcome of 'Food Security and Livelihoods' (FSL) sector aims to improve the overall well-being and resilience of communities that are frequently affected by droughts and conflicts. It encompasses the following aspects i.e., Livelihood Empowerment, Strengthening Local Capacity, Sustainable Livelihoods, Improved Food Security and Building Resilience. Through its initiatives, GREDO seeks to build the resilience of communities, enabling them to withstand shocks and recover from crises. This may involve supporting community-based disaster risk reduction measures, strengthening social safety nets, and facilitating the adoption of climate adaptation strategies. By enhancing resilience, GREDO helps communities better cope with the challenges posed by droughts, conflicts, and other external factors. By focusing on livelihood empowerment, strengthening local capacity, promoting sustainability, improving food security, and building resilience, GREDO contributes to enhancing the overall well-being and quality of life for vulnerable communities in southern states of Somalia.

- ❑ Over the course review period, GREDO supported 45,643 HHs or reached 273,858 individuals through its FSL emergency program and resilience building, this has significantly contributed to the holistic drought response in Somalia and supporting facilities to cope with the stresses and shocks.

Building Resilience: Hawa's Journey Towards Hope

Hawa*, a 30-year-old single mother from Somalia, has faced tremendous challenges due to the devastating effects of drought and displacement. Her story exemplifies the transformative impact of GREDO's humanitarian efforts in partnership with the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) and the Qatar Fund for Development (QFFD). Through their Drought Scale-Up Projects, GREDO has provided critical support to vulnerable communities in the Diinsoor, Berdale, and Baidoa districts of the Bay region, aiming to build resilient communities and restore hope.

Hawa's Struggles

Hawa was once a thriving agropastoral, supporting her family of four children with her farming and livestock ventures. However, consecutive rainy failures caused by climate shocks resulted in the drying up of her land, leading to food and water insecurity. The dire living conditions forced Hawa and her family to leave their home in the Bilile rural area and seek refuge in the Bilile-1 IDP Camp in Diinsoor district. With nothing but the clothes on their backs, Hawa and her children faced immense hardship, lacking shelter, food, and necessities.

GREDO's Intervention

Recognizing the urgent need to respond to the emergency caused by the drought, GREDO implemented a multipurpose cash grant program

with support from the FCDO. Hawa, being one of the most vulnerable households affected by the drought, received three months of cash transfers, amounting to a total of 180 USD, through mobile e-money. This financial assistance brought a ray of hope into Hawa's life, empowering her to address her family's immediate needs.

Transformation and Empowerment

Hawa's gratitude towards GREDO and the FCDO's support is palpable. With the cash grant, she was able to purchase essential food items and settle some of her debts. The newfound stability allowed her to focus on her children's well-being and plan for their future. Hawa's journey from desperation to empowerment exemplifies the positive impact that targeted assistance can have on vulnerable individuals and communities.

GREDO's Commitment to Resilient Communities

The case study of Hawa* is just one of many success stories emerging from GREDO's Drought Scale-Up Projects in partnership with the FCDO and QFFD. These initiatives aim to build resilient communities in the Diinsoor, Berdale, and Baidoa districts, providing vital support to those affected by drought and displacement. By focusing on immediate relief and long-term resilience-building efforts, GREDO is making a tangible difference in the lives of vulnerable individuals like Hawa.

Takeaways

Hawa's story serves as a testament to the transformative power of humanitarian interventions when delivered with compassion and efficiency. GREDO's partnership with the FCDO and QFFD has enabled them to reach vulnerable communities, providing them with a lifeline during times of crisis. However, the ongoing drought continues to threaten the lives and well-being of countless individuals like Hawa. It is imperative for GREDO and other humanitarian agencies to sustain their support, ensuring the resilience and recovery of communities in Somalia. Together, we can forge a path towards a brighter and more prosperous future for all.

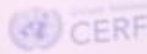
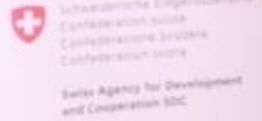

Through these comprehensive efforts, GREDO works to strengthen community resilience from the grassroots level, enabling communities to cope with and recover from recurrent shocks. By focusing on food and nutrition security, enterprise and business development, resilient water and sanitation, community capacity building in resilience, and infrastructural support, GREDO empowers communities to become self-reliant, adapt to changing circumstances, and thrive in the face of challenges.

Increased the target audience, raised awareness, and conducted donor engagement advocacy.

Increased the number of followers, tweets retweets, mentions, and reactions on social media.

Created new pages on Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn, and Inflex.

The number of social media new followers is 3000 followers, with an increased rate of 125%.

Grown an audience increase rate of 116% on Twitter.

The number of followers on Twitter reached +4300, while in March 2022 it was less than 2600. 52% increase.

Summary of the Annual Programs and Operations Review: Reflecting on Achievements and Introducing GREDO's New Strategic Plan

During the Annual Program and Operations Review (APOR) meeting, the Director of Programs (DOP) presented GREDO's 3-year strategic plan for July 2022 to June 2025. The DOP also provided a summary of the achievements of the previous strategic plan, which covered the period from May 2019 to April 2022.

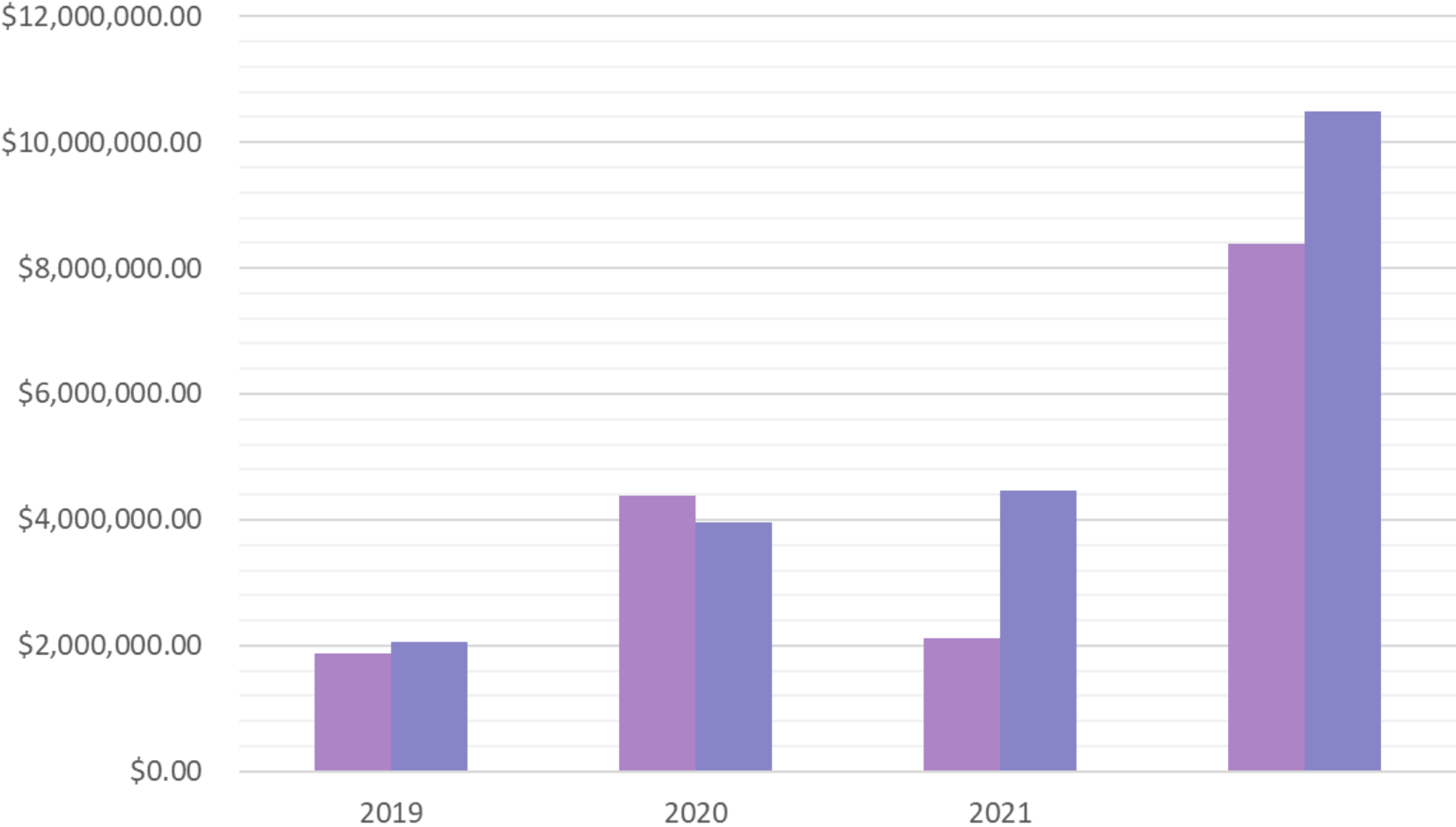
The ended strategic plan had four primary thematic objectives: Health, Nutrition, and Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene; Food Security and Livelihoods and Emergency Response; Basic Education Services; and Good Governance, Peace Building, and Research. GREDO initially projected a plan with a budget of \$8,380,073.20 for these goals. However, by the end of the three-year period, GREDO had managed a funding portfolio of \$10,494,904.00, surpassing the funding target with a 125.24% funding met. This successful achievement indicates that GREDO fully met the goals of the previous strategic plan. The DOP then presented the new strategic plan for July 2022 to June 2025, highlighting the expansion of GREDO's programmatic focus. The new strategic plan includes additional goals to address the evolving needs of the communities served. The driving goals of the new strategic plan are Basic Education Services, Health and Nutrition, Food Security, Livelihoods, Climate Change, and Emergency Response, Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene, Good Governance, Peace Building, and Research, and Protection and Gender Equality.

To achieve these goals, GREDO projected a funding requirement of \$42,691,599.00 over the next three years. As of the 2022/2023 active grants, GREDO stands at a funding met position of 32.90% during the time of the APOR meeting. This indicates that progress has been made in securing funding for the new strategic plan, but further efforts will be needed to meet the projected funding target.

Overall, the APOR meeting provided a platform to review GREDO's organizational performance, reflect on the achievements of the ended strategic plan, and introduce the new strategic plan with expanded goals. GREDO remains committed to its mission of providing essential services and support to the communities in need, and the new strategic plan sets the path for GREDO's future endeavors.

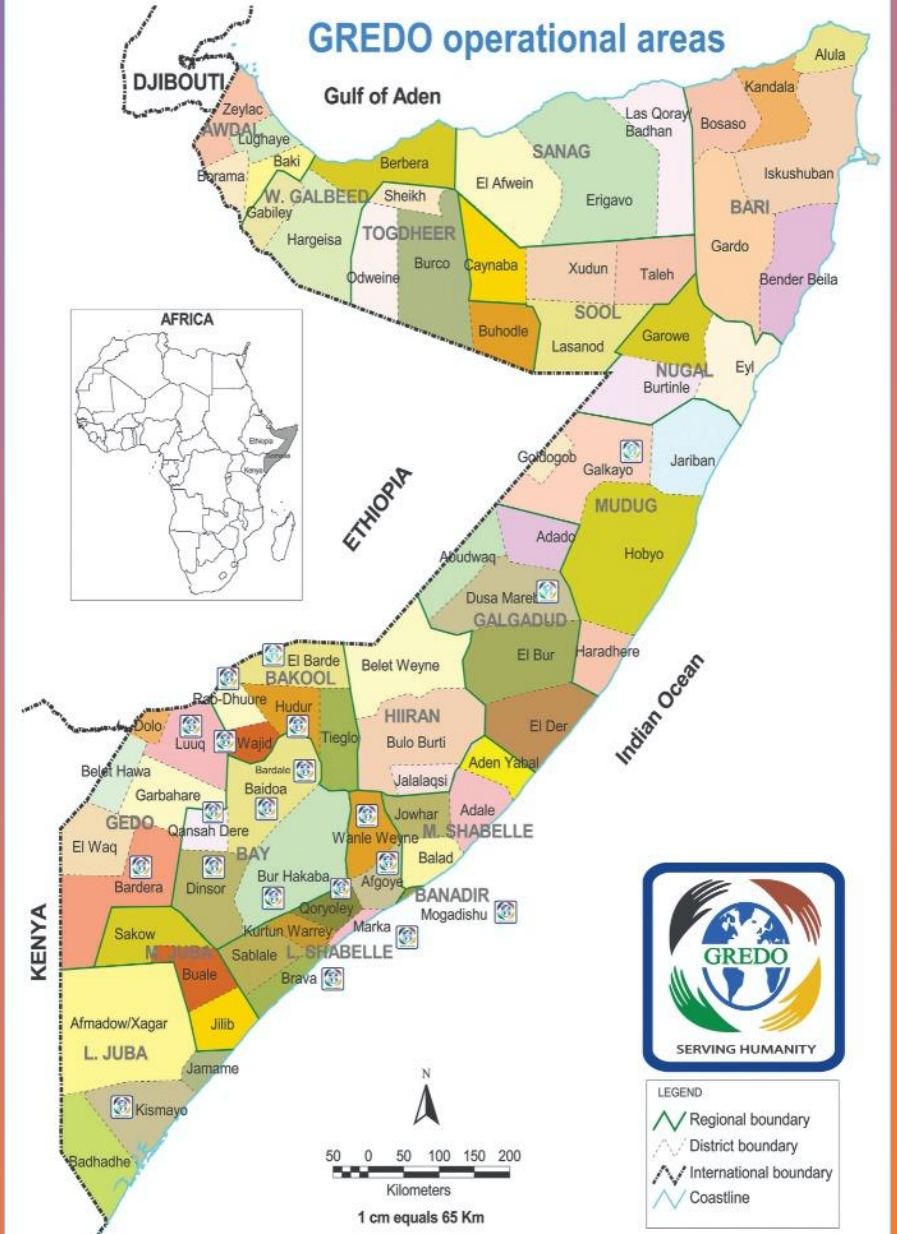
